GRANT DEVELOPMENT PROCESS STEPS





EXAMPLES OF AVAILABLE ASSISTANCE

- Develop high-level outline of project (a "sell sheet").
- Facilitate or participate in project discussions with Grant Program Advisors.
- Provide NOFO summaries and develop grant submission checklists for specific opportunities.
- Provide skeleton outlines for specific opportunities.
- Align project objectives to grant program goals.
- Identify how the project objectives align to relevant local and regional planning documents.
- Develop RACI charts/schedules for distributing responsibilities and key action item dates and deadlines for meeting project deadlines.

- Name of the grant opportunity
- Mandatory NOFO identifiers
- Correct official and address of grantor agency
- How the project satisfies and achieves the NOFO's criteria
- How the project benefits the stakeholder and/or constituents









- Conduct application completeness checks.





GRANT DEVELOPMENT PROCESS STEPS





AVAILABLE ASSISTANCE

- Identify and provide summary of post-award requirements.
- Arrange and participate in debriefs for unsuccessful proposals.
- Provide submission markups for resubmission, if/when desired.
- Assist in developing post-award project implementation schedules factoring grant period of performance, project delivery timelines, and reporting requirements.

12-Year Program (TYP)

- Pennsylvania's official mid-range planning tool
- Lists statewide planned projects and assigns funding to projects over a 12-year period
- The first four years comprise the Statewide Transportation Improvement Program (STIP)






TYP Overview

The TYP is:

- Created by PennDOT and submitted to the State Transportation Commission (STC) for approval
- Updated every two years after regional TIPs are submitted and approved by Metropolitan & Rural Planning Organizations
- Aligned with the goals in the statewide Long-Range Transportation Plan (LRTP)
- Developed in accordance with PA State Law, Act 120 of 1970.



State Transportation Commission (STC)

Purpose & Mission

- Evaluate the condition and performance of PA's transportation system
- Assess resources required to maintain, improve and expand transportation facilities

Role in Planning Process

- Set policy direction for the TYP
- Review and adopt the TYP every two years
- Submit the TYP and STIP to the Governor and Secretary of Transportation every two years

Statewide Transportation Improvement Program (STIP)

- Pennsylvania's short-range planning tool
- Comprised of projects in the first four years of the TYP
- Consists of 26 Transportation Improvement Programs (TIPs)
 - 23 regional
 - 1 independent county
 - 2 statewide


Transportation Improvement Program (TIP)

OVERVIEW OF PA'S NEVI FORMULA PROGRAM



- Provides PA \$171.5 million over next 5 years for electric vehicle (EV) infrastructure
 - Federal Fiscal Year 2022 \$25.4 million
 - Federal Fiscal Years 2023-2026 \$36.5 million annually
- PennDOT submitted state plan on July 21, 2022.
- PennDOT NEVI plan approved on Sept 14, 2022.
- Pre-announcement of Funding Opportunity Oct. 12, 2022
 - Informational Webinar for interested proposers Nov. 1, 2022
- Notice of Funding Opportunity Released January 6, 2023
 - Updated March 13, 2023



EV ALTERNATIVE FUEL CORRIDORS



- PennDOT has nominated corridors over 6 rounds includes interstates and portions of US 30, US 15, Route 1, and Route 422 over 1,800 miles of roadway
- NEVI funding <u>must</u> be applied to AFCs until a "Build-Out" certification by FHWA



PRIORITY LOCATIONS

PRIORITY I:

Selected via gap analysis to most likely meet AFC buildout


PRIORITY II:

Interchanges in locations closer to existing sites/or likely to be redundant.

PRIORITY III:

Interchanges that already has NEVI-qualifying EV charging site.

- Round 1 will focus on Pennsylvania's primary and auxiliary interstate AFC network and includes 11 primary interstates and four (4) auxiliary interstates
- PennDOT's interchange group map shows the ~80 gaps labeled as Priority I, II, or III
- At least one site at an interchange within each Priority I group will be selected first, followed by one site within each of the Priority II groups of interchanges.

March 24, 2023	Any technical questions regarding the NOFO must be submitted to RA-PDEVCorridors@pa.gov. Frequently asked questions and answers will be posted publicly online to the PennDOT NEVI site.
March 27, 2023	Application submission period begins (ability to enter in eGrants system)
May 5, 2023	PA NEVI grant program application submission period ends at 5 PM EDT
May – June 2023	PennDOT application review
July 2023	Preliminary award approval and denial notifications
July – September 2023	PennDOT NEPA Process
September 2023	Final award approval and denial notifications
October – November 2023	Grant agreement execution; Notice to Proceed



CFI GRANT PROGRAM

Charging and Fueling Infrastructure (CFI) Discretionary Grant Program

- Provides \$2.5 billion over 5 years for alternative fueling projects
- \$700 million available in first round of funding (FY 22' and 23')
- Awardees must provide 20% of total project cost

Funding is split between two categories

- Community Charging and Fueling Grants (Community Program)
- Alternative Fuel Corridor Grants (Corridor Program)

Project Merit Criteria

- Safety
- Climate Change, Resiliency, and Sustainability
- Equity, Community Engagement, and Justice40
- Workforce development, job quality, and wealth creation
- CFI Program Vision

Eligible Entities

States, Local Governments, Planning Agencies (MPOs/RPOs), Transit and Port Authorities, and Tribal Governments

*Application deadline is May 30, 2023, 11:59 p.m.



CFI GRANT PROGRAM

Community Charging and Fueling Grants (Community Program) - \$350 million

- Minimum award is \$500,000 Maximum award is \$15 million
- More than 1 mile from an AFC. Located on any public road or publicly accessible location.
- Priority for projects in rural areas, low-to-moderate income neighborhoods, and communities with a low ratio of private parking spaces to households or a high ratio of multiunit dwellings to single-family homes.

Alternative Fuel Corridor Grants (Corridor Program) - \$350 million

- Minimum award is \$1 million No maximum
- EV chargers must be no more than 1 mile from an AFC.
 - Hydrogen, Propane, or Natural Gas projects must be no more than 5 miles from an AFC.
- Must contract with a private entity for acquisition and installation, or operation of infrastructure.

*PennDOT will consider providing support for regional projects as applicable. Inquiries should be sent to RA-PDEVCORRIDORS@pa.gov. The deadline for requesting PennDOT support is May 16, 2023.






DCNR – PennDOT Funding Opportunities

- Bike/Ped connections to parks, to downtowns, to schools, to businesses (*Multimodal Projects*)
- DCNR funding for designing/engineering to support PennDOT for trail development (*Design Only Projects*)
- Rehabbing an existing or build additional miles of trail, bridges, tunnels, culverts, etc. (*Trail Development/Rehabilitation Projects*)





PROJECT EXAMPLES (Central PA): Capital Area Greenbelt and Spring Creek Restoration Project (Dauphin County)



Spring Creek crisscrosses a section of the 20-mile Capital Area Greenbelt through wooded area in Paxtang Borough referred to as the Paxton Creek Parkway


Spring Creek is severely degraded and is eroding the trail and sewer infrastructure

Funding Sources:

- PennDOT TASA (Transportation Alternatives Set-Aside) Funding Award \$894,900 for trail rehabilitation of Paxtang Parkway portion of the Capital Area Greenbelt
- DCNR Streambank Restoration Grant of \$697,000 for 2,400 feet along Spring Creek matched PennDOT's TASA funding



PROJECT EXAMPLES (Eastern PA): Jordan Creek Greenway (Lehigh County)



Jordan Creek Greenway is a 14-mile trail between Allentown and 1,100 Acre Trexler Nature Preserve.


Dual Purpose Trail protects health of Jordan Creek and connects communities of Allentown, Whitehall, North Whitehall and South Whitehall to Trexler Nature Preserve

Funding Sources:

- 1.98-mile segment in Allentown funded with \$500,000 DCNR (Design Only Grant)
- Leveraged 1 million PennDOT Transportation Alternatives Program



PROJECT EXAMPLES (Western PA): Brady Tunnel, Armstrong Rail Trail (Clarion County)



Rehabilitation of a former 2,468-foot-long railroad tunnel and development of 4.5-miles of the 35 mile Armstrong Rail Trail

Funding sources:


- Armstrong Trails first received \$1.3 million from PennVEST for the stormwater improvements and access road
- PennVEST Funding leveraged \$3.8 million from DCNR for the design and rehabilitation of the tunnel and trail
- DCNR funding leveraged \$350,000 from ARC and \$2 million of PennDOT funding for replacement of the Tunnel's liner.
